The 25th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee

Music by William Finn, book by Rachel Sheinkin

Six awkward spelling champions learn that winning (and losing) isn't everything. An eclectic group of six mid-pubescents vie for the spelling championship of a lifetime. While candidly disclosing hilarious and touching stories from their home lives, the tweens spell their way through a series of words, hoping never to hear the soul-crushing, pout-inducing, life unaffirming "ding" of the bell that signals a spelling mistake. Six spellers enter; one speller leaves a champion! At least the losers get a juice box.

PLEASE NOTE: The tweens in the cast are played by older actors – late teens or young adults. You should audition regardless of your age.

Cast of Characters

The Kids

Chip Tolentino - Tenor

The reigning spelling champion of Putnam County, relatively athletic and social, he expects things to come easily to him. Lately though, he's been going through some weird changes, and things are slipping out of his control. (Actor also plays Jesus.)

Logainne SchwartzandGrubenniere - Mezzo

Younger than most bee participants, she is driven by internal and external pressurebut above all by a desire to win to make her two fathers (from whom she takes her combined last name) proud. She lisps, is a little uncomfortable in her body, and has some tics.

Leaf Coneybear – Bari-tenor

A second alternate, he never expected to compete here today. Home-schooled with his many siblings, everything about this public bee is an adventure for him, from meeting the other kids to showing off his homemade clothing, to each moment of unexpected attention. He may have severe attention deficit disorder but delights in his own wandering focus. (Actor also plays Carl Dad.)

William Barfee – Bari-tenor

Has a host of health problems and a lot to prove. Loud and combative as a defensive posture, he is the heavy kid who becomes a bully to avoid being picked on. William does not expect kindness from anyone but his mother. So, friendship takes him by surprise. Still, he's noticed on the spelling circuit for his remarkable technique - spelling words out on the floor with his foot. Taken out of competition last year because of an ill-timed allergic reaction, he's here for vindication.

Marcy Park - Mezzo

The ultimate over-achiever, Marcy comes from a family where excellence is expected and so simply produced. A parochial school student, she assumes God, too, expects perfection. She sees herself as a mass of problems, but she keeps them to herself. Having moved often because of her parents' work, she knows she can beat the local competition. Her many talents include piano, dance, martial arts, baton twirling, and/or whatever special gifts this actor has.

Olive Ostrovsky – Mezzo with belt

A word lover, Olive has a quiet life. An only child with often-absent parents, Olive spends a lot of her time alone. She fills some of that time reading the dictionary - the words bring her comfort. During the first half of the bee, she often peers into the audience to see if her father, who is delayed at work, has made it yet. She starts enormously shy, and shyly blossoms.

The Adults

Rona Lisa Perretti - Mezzo

Putnam's long-time spelling bee hostess, a local realtor, and 3rd Annual Putnam County spelling champion. This is the Rona's day to be queen. From her perspective she keeps the bee running smoothly, upholds protocol, and conveys crucial information to the audience. Her interest in the competition is unflagging and drives it forward. (Actor also plays Olive's mum in fantasy.)

Vice Principal Douglas Panch - Baritone

Douglas is frustrated with his life. He fell into education, less out of love than a general ability uncoupled to a particular passion. The drive of the young spellers is alien to him. He never found anything that important. Stuck in his current job, endlessly awaiting a promotion that isn't coming, he was not happy to get the call this morning that he was needed to substitute; but he starts the bee eager to do well.

Mitch Mahoney

With a bouncer's physique and demeanor, Mitch appears an odd choice to be the bee's "comfort counselor," but it's part of his community service assignment. The outsider, who in a way gets to inhabit the audience perspective, he wonders about the wisdom of putting the kids through this at all. He has no idea how to offer comfort but does increasingly find himself wishing he could find a way to make the kids feel better about losing. (Actor also plays Dan Dad and Olive's Dad in fantasy.)

The Miracle Worker by William Gibson

Twelve-year-old Helen Keller lived in a prison of silence and darkness. Deaf, blind, and mute from an illness as a baby, with no way to express herself or comprehend those around her, she flew into primal rages against anyone who tried to help her, fighting tooth and nail with a strength born of furious desperation.

Then Annie Sullivan came. Half-blind herself, but possessing an almost fanatical determination, she would begin a frightening and incredibly moving struggle to tame the wild girl no one could reach...

Cast of Characters

Note: the age listed for a character is not necessarily the age of the actor.

Captain Keller (40s – early 50s) Helen's father. Stern but devoted to his wife and family. Struggles to connect with young Helen, but is loving, nonetheless. Learns to trust Annie.

Kate Keller (20s – early 30s) – the Captain's second wife and Helen's mother. Tormented by Helen's seemingly insurmountable disability. Tries to please Helen to avoid the tantrums and to compensate for her misfortune. Dedicated to her husband and a fiercely devoted mother as well. Determined to give Helen every chance she can get.

Helen Keller (11-13) - Is deaf, blind, and mute. Trapped in her own world but seems desperate to know more. Develops a strong relationship with Annie after initially refusing to cooperate. *See note below re ANNIE AND HELEN.

James Keller (17-21) – the Captain's son by his first wife. Helen's half-brother. Somewhat apathetic and opinionated. Believes Helen is mentally defective and should be placed in an asylum. Learns to respect Annie and her work.

Annie Sullivan (20s – early 30s) – Helen's teacher. A strong and vibrant woman who is determined to connect Helen to her world. Undeterred by Kate and the Captain's interference, Helen's early responses, and numerous setbacks, she goes above and beyond, overcoming her personal demons along the way.

*ANNIE AND HELEN: the actors playing Annie and Helen will receive extensive, dedicated rehearsal time to find an understanding of the world Helen lives in and to be prepared for the physical challenges of the scene work.

Aunt Ev -(40s - 50s) - Helen's aunt, the Captain's sister. Well-meaning, talkative, and opinionated. But Ev encourages the Kellers to connect with the Perkins Institute and eventually, Annie.

Dr Anagnos (45-70) – Annie's counselor at the Perkins Institute. A dear and kind man – very fond of Annie and her journey. Serves as both her mentor and friend.

Viney (50-65) – A housekeeper for the Kellers. Cheerful and thoughtful. Loving towards the Keller children.

Martha - (8 - 12) - a playmate of Helen.

Percy -(8-12) - a playmate of Helen.

Six Girls – (between 8 - 14) – who attend the Perkins Institution for the Blind in Boston. They are extremely fond of Annie and can't bear that she's leaving.

The Doctor (50 - 70) – diagnoses Helen's illness and predicts she will live.

The Birds and the Bees by Mark Crawford

Sarah, a turkey farmer, has split up with her husband and moved in with her mom, Gail, a beekeeper. Add in Earl, the flirty neighbour, and Ben, an eager young graduate student, and you have the perfect breeding ground for unlikely attractions. Set in adjoining bedrooms, **The Birds and the Bees** is a **Canadian** comedy about love, lust, beekeeping, and the artificial insemination of turkeys.

Cast of Characters

Sarah - 38 – a turkey farmer, Gail's daughter. Having just separated from her husband, she is seeking a brief respite at her mother's.

Gail – 62 – a beekeeper, Sarah's mum. Divorced, self-repressed and traditional. Dealing with several issues of her own, including declining bee populations. Would love a grandchild.

Earl - 63 - a cash cropper, Gail's neighbour, and rents farmland from her. Very supportive. Blunt and flirty.

Ben -23 – a student of entomology. A hot scientist with lots to learn.

Early Stages An Apprenticeship Theatre Program

Early Stages is an apprenticeship theatre program for young performers aged 10 to 14. Participants will take classes with Artistic Producer Scot Denton and instructors who are students or graduates of college performance programs. Classes will include voice and text, improvisation, acting and movement and will take place at St George's Anglican Church in Haliburton during the month of July. Classes will begin July 2 and run during the daytime Monday to Thursday (excluding July 1) for four weeks. There will be a presentation of work created at a suitable venue late in July. Early Stages began in 2014 – a number of the participants have gone on to take part in Highlands Summer Festival productions. The cost is \$250. There are a couple of bursaries available for Early Stages – please speak to Stella Voisin at 705-4524 if you would like more information.

Audition Requirements

- Please complete and print the last page of this package (page 9 the Audition Information Sheet) and bring it to your audition.
- Dress comfortably, bring indoor shoes, and wear a mask if you wish.

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Those who are new to the Festival should be prepared to either perform a short monologue (maximum 2 minutes) or tell a short story. You may be asked to read "sides" (a short scene) – this may extend your audition time.

If you wish to audition for the musical (and are new to us), we will need to hear you sing. You can sing a cappella (without accompaniment), or you can sing with a backing track on a device (make sure it is a karaoke track—we want to hear you sing), or Melissa Stephens will accompany you playing **music which you provide.** Please sing something **which is NOT from** *Spelling* **Bee.** We may only need to hear 16 bars of the song. If you have questions about singing at your audition, please contact Melissa Stephens – 705-455-2366

You are encouraged to be familiar with the plays and the musical. Please note - The casting process takes time and is a critical part of each production – it may be several weeks before it is finalized.

Rehearsal Schedule

It is our expectation that a minimum of 100 hours of rehearsal time for each production will have been achieved prior to performance (120 hours for *Spelling Bee*). The weekly rehearsal schedule will be established by the director with the stage manager. However, each production rehearses every week on Saturday and Sunday during the day, beginning at the end of April or some time in May, depending on the date of the production's opening. Actors cast in ensemble roles in the musical or supporting roles in *Miracle Worker* will not be required at every rehearsal.

Please note: The Festival moves into the theatre towards the end of June. During the <u>ten days to two weeks</u> prior to each production's opening (see dates below), rehearsals will be more frequent, and will require everyone in attendance.
